### Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

#### Statement of intent

Our aim is to use Pupil Premium funding to help us improve and sustain higher attainment for disadvantaged pupils at our school that is comparable with non-disadvantaged pupils.

During the period of this strategy, we will focus on key challenges that are preventing our disadvantaged pupils from attaining well; Social and emotional barriers, parental support and lower attainment and progress in reading, writing and maths.

Our approach will be responsive to both common challenges and our pupils individual needs, rooted in robust assessments not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage.

Our expectation is that all pupils, irrespective of background or challenges they face, leave Overstone Primary School with high aspirations and ambition for the future. Through our curriculum, we aim to enable them to have the confidence, skills and knowledge to engage in conversations, respect the opinions of others and share their own informed opinions and ideas.

#### **Challenges**

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Some pupils have personal social and emotional barriers, which inhibit their readiness to learn when coming into school. Some pupils have low aspirations in school and appear less motivated to do well in all subjects.
2	Across the year groups, more pupils are not on track for writing (and maths) than for other subjects.
3	Lack of parental support for some pupils; lack of engagement with home learning and lack of support with challenge and homework.
4	Lateness and poor attendance
5	Proportion of PP children with SEN
6	Attachment issues with a number of PP children including ExLAC or special guardianship

Pupil premium pupils will display positive learning behaviours including independence and resilience and they will readily accept challenge.	Pupil premium pupils will display positive attitudes to learning and they will be celebrated for their learning behaviour in class and in well done assemblies. Their work will demonstrate challenge which they will approach positively. High aspirations and ambition will be encouraged.
To identify and reduce Social and Emotional barriers	Pupil premium children's readiness to learn will increase and they will show increased engagement in all subjects
To improve the punctuality and attendance of Pupil Premium children.	Pupil premium children will display higher levels of attendance and reduced number of late marks in the register.

# Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

#### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

Pupil premium children have received targeted support in a number of areas to ensure that their performance is supported to achieve in line with non-pupil premium children.

In 2021-22 There were more children at the expected standard in both maths and writing than in 2020-21.

Reading was slightly below the previous year and will continue to be a focus.

Funding has been used to provide 1:1 reading support throughout the year using the Beanstalk programme.

Pupil Premium children benefited from individual and small group targeted wellbeing support throughout the year and families were supported by an allocated Family Support Worker provided through Pupil Premium funding.

As a result of pupil premium funding children were able to access a residential trip to Whitemoor Lakes Activity Centre where they participated in team building, physical and mentally challenging activities which improved overall confidence and wellbeing.

Throughout the year Pupil Premium has funded places in sports and activity clubs to keep children physically and mentally fit and active as well as providing healthy breakfasts at breakfast club throughout the week.
